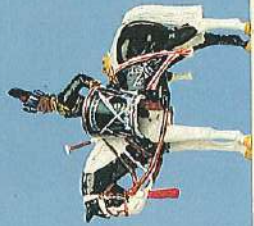

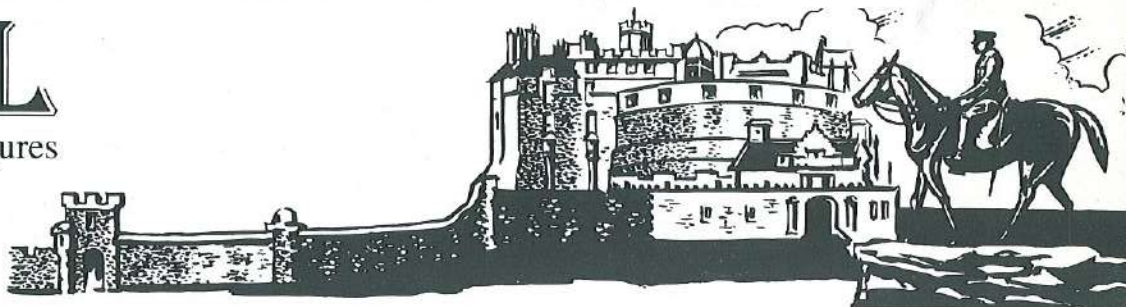

DRUMS MASCOTS AND GURKHAS

DRUM HORSES Almost all cavalry regiments had musicians to help them on the march. The drum beat was the most influential sound so the Drum Horse was placed at the head of the band in a prominent position. As they were the most noticeable feature of the Regiment the Drum Horse was usually of an outstanding colour and bedecked in a more flamboyant harness and saddlery. The kettledrums are draped with what are known as drum banners - these banners being in duplicate except in the case of the 21st Lancers where each banner differs. Those regiments who had silver drums, showed them off by draping the drum banners loosely, or as in the 3rd Hussars the battle honours were embossed on the drums so no drum banners were worn, another feature of the 3rd is the 3" silver 'dog collar', worn around the neck of the Drummer. For Hussars and Lancers the drum banners were the only opportunity to show off their battle honours; as Light Cavalry, used for skirmishing, they did not carry colours. However, during the 1950's as they were mechanised and lost their horses Guidons were presented to all the current Hussar and Lancer Regiments.

REGIMENTAL MASCOTS The dictionary defines mascots as 'deemed to bring good luck'. Many mascots are indicative of the recruiting area of many regiments; the Derbyshire rams and the Welsh goats. Although in most cases there is only one regimental mascot, each of the battalions of the Welsh regiments have a goat (usually presented from the Royal Herd) and the Parachute Regiment have two Shetland Ponies. When the custom first started is not clear, the earliest record is of a goat belonging to The Royal Welch Fusiliers accompanying them in the American War of Independence and was present at the Battle of Bunker Hill in June 1775. This goat has had many successors in the regiment, down to the present day. Attired in beautiful coats often emblazoned with regimental badges and battle honours the regimental mascot usually paraded with the band on parade. Although dogs, goats, sheep and ponies were the most common animals used as mascots a variety of others have been chronicled such as a goose, a pelican, a kangaroo, an elephant and a mule. At the end of their lives the mascot was often stuffed for display in the regimental museum, or in the case of Sam, the Newfoundland dog belonging to the Prince of Wales's Leinster Regiment (Royal Canadians), as a memorial to him when he died in 1866, his beautiful coat was made into an apron for the big Drummer.

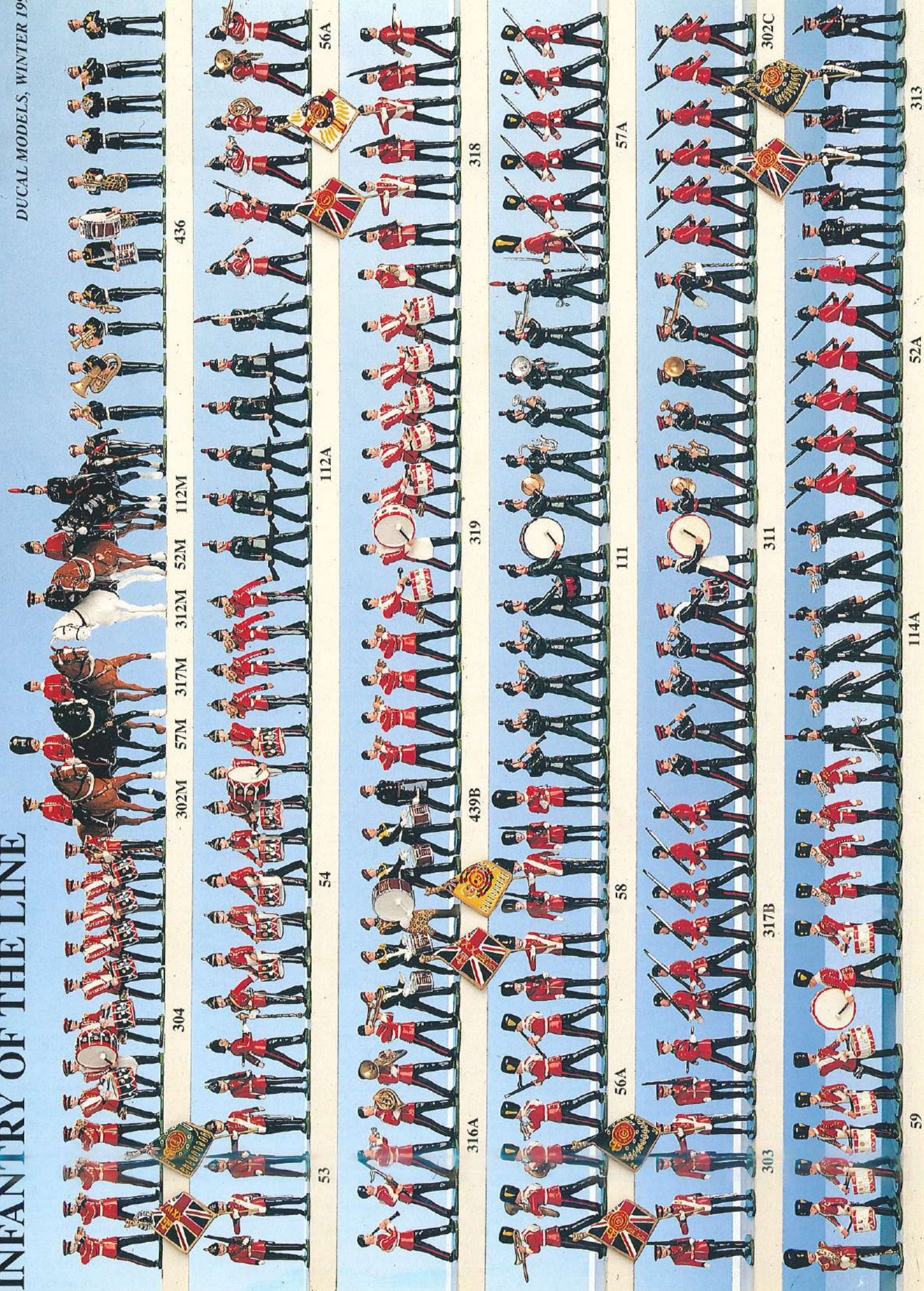

THE GURKHAS. In 1814 - 1816 when the British East India Company went to war with Nepal they were so impressed with their Gurkha opponents that after the war a native regiment was raised which eventually became the 1st Malaun Regiment. This began an association with the British that is only soon due to end after over 150 years. The Gurkhas were the mercenaries of the British Army as usually the regular native troops were inhabitants of part of the British Empire. By 1914 there were 10 Gurkha Rifle Regiments with many Battalions. In 1947 at the partition of India six regiments went to the Indian Army, and the 2nd, 6th, 7th and 10th Gurkha Rifles remained on the strength of the British. Units of the Gurkha Engineers, Signals, Transport and Military Police were soon formed. For marching music the only Military Band for all the units is the 2nd King Edward's Own Gurkha Rifles whilst all the other units, except the Military Police, have Pipes and Drums. As Rifles Regiments and Corps there are NO Colours but the 2nd are unique in having the Queen's Truncheon awarded by Queen Victoria for distinguished service at the siege of Delhi, in 1857, which is carried and is accorded the same customs and respect of Infantry Colours. The Pipes and Drums of the 7th wear Douglas tartan and the 10th the Hunting Stewart, both of these bands wear tartan trews. The Pipers plaid, pipe bag cover and pipe ribbons of the Transport Regiment is the MacDuff tartan, the Engineers is in the Macleod of Harris and the Signal Regiment wear the Grant.

Our seated Civilian range has been extended and with the bank of four benches shown on this sheet will make a fine display of spectators to watch your parades, some could be waving flags from the selection we have produced to add some realism to your crowd scenes. A selection of various dogs, some small and some large, to run around the park or just to lie in the garden will give a different slant on any display.

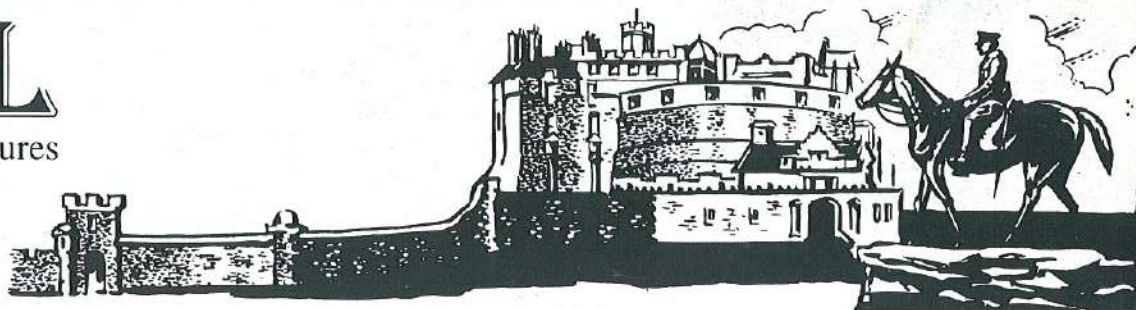

Artistic Licence - although we at DUCAL MODELS go to extreme lengths to verify the uniform details, we produce 'Toy Soldiers' and as such we have decided to keep the original style of soldiers with rifles at the slope but as the breakage rate is high we do not, as a rule supply them with fixed bayonets. However we do occasionally make minor changes to update our figures.

REGIMENTS OF THE LINE named from the early days of the Army when foes fought facing each other in a line. The two branches of the Army were known as Regiments of Horse or of Foot, the lower the number the more senior the regiment. The Infantry Regiments were raised as war necessitated and were numbered as they were raised and usually disbanded at the cessation of war. As the requirement for a larger army grew, more regiments were kept on the establishment. Unlike the Scottish Regiments the rest of the British Infantry all wore the same uniform of red jacket and blue trousers, only distinguishable by the facing colours at collar and cuffs and the shape of the head-dress or plume attached to it. During the fighting the black gun powder used for the Brown Bess muskets of the Line and the guns of the Artillery produced a thick smoke. A full Regiment of 1000 men had a frontage of about 800 feet and in the smoke and din of the battle the colours were the rallying point for the men. If the colours were lost it had a disastrous effect as the cohesion would not exist to enable the soldiers to identify their own colour, and, to prove that all was well the Colours were Trooped every evening and laid up in the Officers billet and Trooped again next morning. Various ceremonial dress are shown in our range of Infantry and the side hat, forage cap, beret and the blue No.1 dress have been worn by all the regiments of the Army in different eras. In 1881 the Regular Infantry of the British Army consisted of 109 Regiments of Foot and The Rifle Brigade. The Cardwell reforms saw an amalgamation of many regiments combining two Regiments of Foot under a new title with consequential changes in badges and facing colours. At this time the territorial system was introduced where regiments were allocated an area in which to recruit resulting in the formation of many of the County Regiments.

THE KING'S OWN (ROYAL LANCASTER REGIMENT) (4th Foot) raised in 1680 the distinctions of a Royal Regiment can be seen here in the blue of the facings and the Regimental Colour, the Royal colours of blue, red and yellow in the bugle cords and the wide red band of the Forage or No.1 dress cap. The Colours depicted were presented at Calcutta on 30th December 1905. In 1959 they amalgamated with the Border Regiment (34th & 55th Foot) to form The King's Own Royal Border Regiment (4,34 & 55).

THE LANCASHIRE FUSILIERS (20th Foot) raised 1688, the uniform shown is; Raccoon skin cap with primrose yellow plume on left, scarlet tunic and white facings. Bugle cords of all Light Infantry and all Regiments other than Royal to be green. The Colours depicted were presented at Dublin on 1st August 1859 when the regimental facings were yellow. The Royal Regiment of Fusiliers, raised in 1685 (later the 7th Foot), and the Royal Scots Fusiliers were the only ones which had been literally Fusilier Regiments - armed exclusively with the Fusil, a superior and handier type of flintlock musket. This was a special issue, when other regiments were still using match-locks, as the original purpose of the Fusiliers was to provide escorts for the Artillery, and the fuse of the match-lock emitted sparks which sometimes blew up the gunners powder barrels. The other Fusilier Regiments were; Northumberland, Royal Scots, Royal Welsh, Royal Inniskilling, Royal Irish, Royal Munster and Royal Dublin and were, at various dates, granted the title and the Head-dress as a special distinction, without involving any change from the function of a normal Infantry Regiment. The Lancashire Fusiliers were disbanded in 1968.

SOUTH WALES BORDERERS (24th Foot) raised in 1689, the Regiment has one of the most remarkable histories in the British Army, having twice been almost annihilated, at Chillianwallah in 1849 where 23 Officers and 527 men were killed and wounded; and in 1879 at Isandhlwana where the losses in killed alone reached the appalling total of 21 Officers and 590 men. A silver wreath is borne on the staff of the Queen's Colour to commemorate the devoted gallantry of Lieutenants Melville and Coghill in saving the Colour from the hands of the Zulus and as a tribute to the gallant defence of Rorkes Drift. The Colours depicted were presented at Gibraltar in 1880 to replace the pair lost at Isandhlwana. It was the fashion for Bandsmen, Drummers and Buglers when wearing the Home Service Pattern Helmet to have the chin scales looped up, the remainder of the Regiment wearing the scales under the chin when on parade. The Regimental March is Men of Harlech. In 1968 the S.W.B. amalgamated with The Welsh Regiment to form The Royal Regiment of Wales (24,41 & 69).

THE EAST SURREY REGIMENT (31st (raised 1702) & 70th (raised 1756) Foot) here wearing the Field Service Cap. The Colours of the 1st Battalion were presented at Aldershot on 26th May 1903 and have the red St. Georges Cross on the uniform facing colour (you couldn't have a white flag), but the Colours of the 2nd Battalion were unusual as they were black with a red St. Georges Cross the facing colour of the old 70th Foot and were presented at Aldershot in 1867. Amalgamated in 1959 with The Queen's Royal Regiment (2nd Foot) to form The Queen's Royal Surrey Regiment (2, 31 & 70), and became in 1966 The 1st Battalion The Queen's Regiment; in 1992 amalgamation with The Royal Hampshire Regiment resulted in The Princess of Wales's Royal Regiment (PWRR) (Queen's and Royal Hampshire).

THE ROYAL BERKSHIRE REGIMENT (49th & 66th Foot) raised in 1744 & 1755, here wearing the No.1 Dress ceremonial uniform, devised for the 1937 Coronation with the Forage Cap. Apart from the red cap band these could be any Regiment or Corps of the period. The Colours depicted were presented at Windsor in 1956. In 1959 they amalgamated with The Wiltshire Regiment to form The Duke of Edinburgh's Royal Regiment (Berkshire & Wiltshire) (49, 62, 66 & 99); in 1992 amalgamation with the Gloucestershire Regiment resulted in The Royal Gloucestershire, Berkshire and Wiltshire Regiment.

THE KING'S ROYAL RIFLE CORPS (60th Foot) in 1797 the 5th Battalion of the 60th Foot were raised as an experimental unit armed with the Baker Rifle, the existing musket was inaccurate, so, for effect, had to be fired in volleys at close quarters. The new rifle was a more accurate weapon so aimed shots could be fired at individuals and to take advantage of this the riflemen wore a green uniform to gain some degree of camouflage and went ahead of the Line. They were used as shock troops and marched at a faster rate than the rest of the Army. Rifle Regiments NEVER had colours, amalgamation in 1968 with the Rifle Brigade resulted in the new regiment, The Royal Greenjackets.

THE PARACHUTE REGIMENT Proud wearers of the unique 'Red Beret', being the most recent of the infantry regiments is shown here wearing No.1 Dress and the 'Universal' Beret. Apart from Colour differences this could be any regiment of the period. The Colour Party and men wear No.2 Dress and carry the F.N. Rifle.

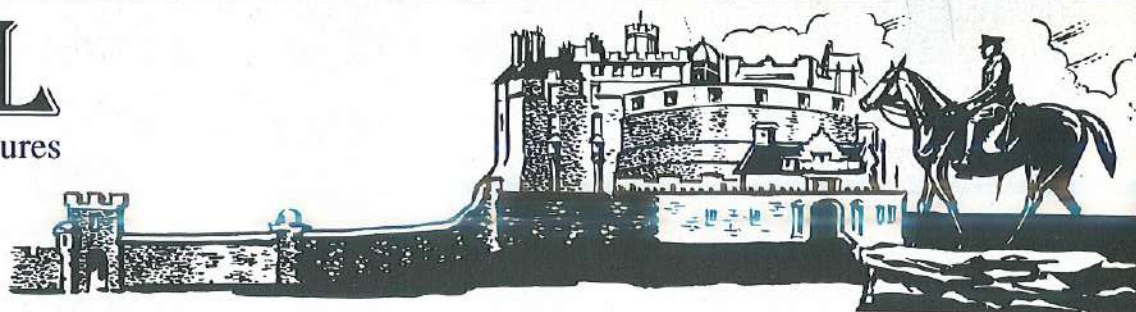

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THE SWIRL OF THE KILTS

Illustrated are our examples of Scotland's only regular Cavalry (Scotland's senior) Regiment, and the Highland Regiments of the Line. The following are general notes on Scottish Highland uniforms: Plaids were worn by all ranks in full dress. Viz 'Fly' - hung from the left epaulette button for Corporals & Privates, as before but two ends onto left breast fixed by a circular brooch for Officers & Sergeants. Full Plaid - worn around the chest, fixed by a brooch, the ends falling to the rear, worn by Field Officers, Regimental Sergeant Majors, Pipers and Bandsmen.

All Highland Regiments wore the feather bonnet with a white plume, (or as stated), and a red doublet. Pipers usually wore entirely different uniforms to the rest of the Regiment the doublet of the Highland Pipers was green (Lowland Pipers was blue), they had a dirk on the right hip and in the main wore a blue Glengarry with black cock's feathers, the Pipe Major usually has gold lace and a different sporran to the Pipers who wear silver lace.

The Drum Major is the senior Drummer and is dressed in an Officers style doublet with a Full Plaid, gold lace and different sporran. The Drummers distinction is the white lace with its red crowns that covers all the seams of their tunic. Bandmasters are usually dressed as Officers.

The Pipe, Drum, and Bugle are all instruments of command and were used on the field of Battle. Historically Heralds were deemed to be inviolate so distinctive uniforms were evolved. In the 18th century, opposite colours were worn viz. red jackets and yellow facings of the soldiers would be a yellow jacket and red facings of drummers & pipers.

ROYAL SCOTS DRAGOON GUARDS formed in 1771 through an amalgamation of the Royal Scots Greys (2nd Dragoons) and the 3rd Carabiniers (in 1922 the 3rd Dragoon Guards and the 6th Dragoon Guards (Carabiniers)). Traditionally the Cavalry only had Trumpeters and Musicians and they were distinguished by having a different coloured plume. The famous unique White Bearskin is reputed to have been presented by the Tsar of Russia when he was Colonel-in-Chief of the Royal Scots Greys. It is worn by the Kettledrummer or, when dismounted, by the Bass Drummer in the Band. The pipes and drums formed about 30 years ago from volunteers in the ranks. The Drummers wear the uniform and bearskin of the Regiment, the Band having a different shaped bearskin to the rest of the regiment. The Pipers wear the Royal Stewart tartan, feather bonnets, white plume and yellow vandyking on the hatband.

THE BLACK WATCH was formed in 1881 from the 42nd Royal Highland (1739) and 73rd Perthshire (1786). The regiment wore, in full dress, their unique red Vulture feather plume, blue facings, the Government tartan, white sporran with 5 black tails, and red and black diced hose. The Pipers wear the Royal Stewart tartan. Regimental march is Highland Laddie.

SEAFORTH HIGHLANDERS In 1881 were the 72nd (Duke of Albany's Own) Highlanders (formed 1778) and the 78th Highland Regiment (Ross-shire Buffs) (formed 1778), they wore buff facings, MacKenzie tartan, sporran white with 2 black tails and red & white hose, the bandsmen have a red plume. However, the pipers wear a sporran of brown goat hair with 2 black tails, and MacKenzie hose. We portray the 2nd Battalion without a black cock's feather. Regimental marches are - Band - Blue Bonnets over the Border, Pipes and Drums - Pibroch of Donuil Dhu. They amalgamated with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders in 1961 to form the Queen's Own Highlanders.

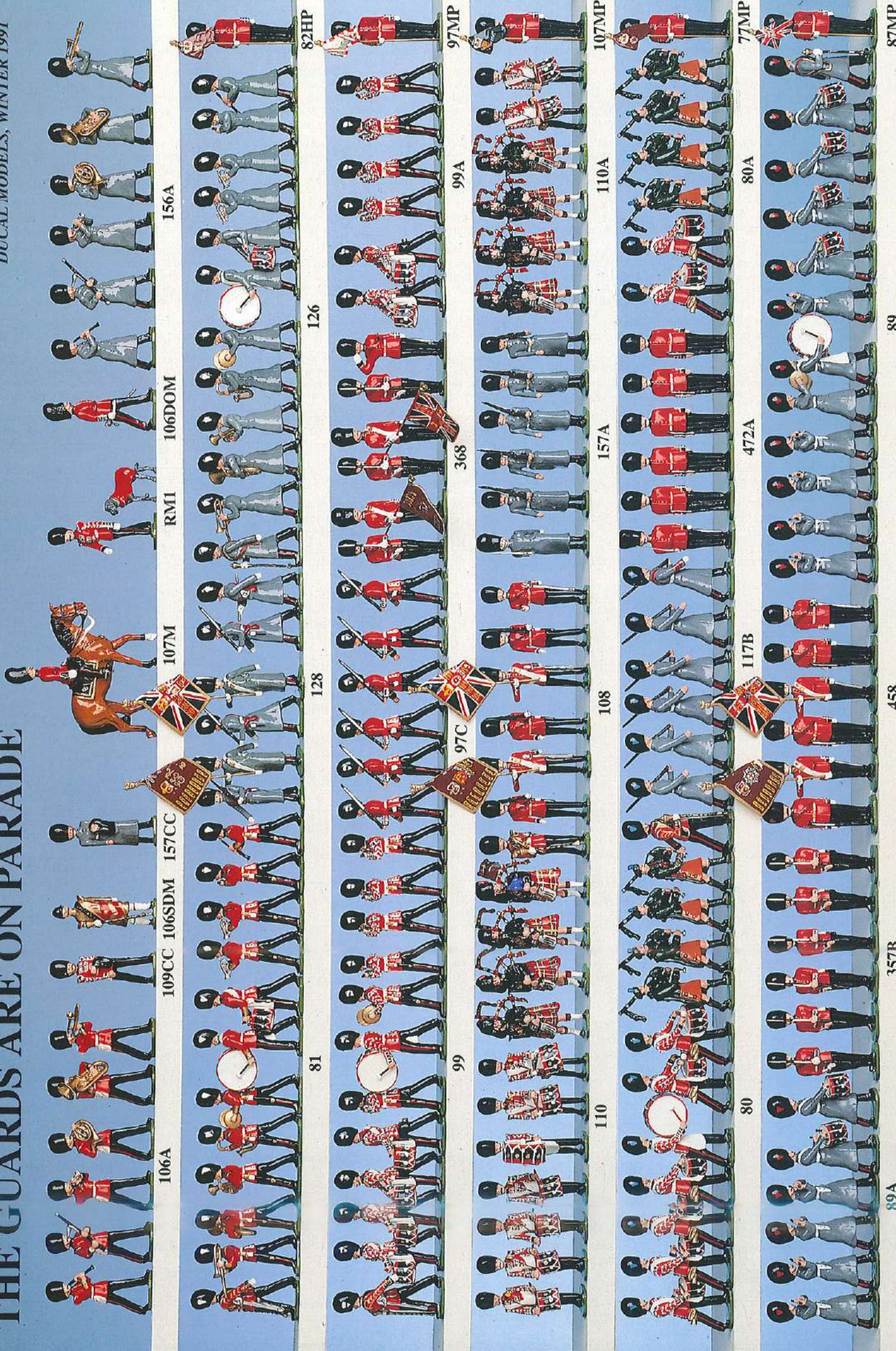
THE GORDON HIGHLANDERS In 1881 were the 75th (Stirlingshire) Regiment (formed 1787) and the 92nd Gordon Highlanders (1794), they wear yellow facings, Gordon tartan, sporran white with 2 black tails and red and black diced hose (later changed to red and white) and are unique that they have black buttons on their spats, the Bandsman's plume is red over white. The Pipers wear red and black hose. Regimental march is - Cock of the North. Soon to amalgamate with Queen's Own Highlanders.

THE QUEEN'S OWN CAMERON HIGHLANDERS Raised in 1763 as the 79th Foot they wear blue facings, Cameron of Erracht tartan, sporran black with 2 white tails and red and green diced hose, Pipers wear a Glengarry with an eagle feather, and Regimental tartan (in 1934 changed to Royal Stewart). All Pipers have pipe banners. Regimental marches - Pipes - Quick time: Pibroch of Donuil Dhu, Band - Slow time: Logie of Buchan. Amalgamated in 1961 with the Seaforth Highlanders to form Queen's Own Highlanders.

THE ARGYLL AND SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS In 1881 were the 91st Argyllshire Highlanders (1794) and the 93rd Sutherland Highlanders (1799). Sporrans are the bane in this uniform. The regimental sporran is black with 6 white tails, Officers and Sergeants have a Badger, complete with head and 6 white tails. The Drum Major's is white with 3 black tails, Drummers white with 2 black tails, Pipe Major brown with 3 black tails, Pipers brown with 2 black tails. The uniform - yellow facings, Argyll tartan and red and white diced hose. Bandsmen have a red plume. Pipers wear red and green hose. Regimental marches: 1st Battalion - The Campbells are Coming, 2nd Battalion - Highland Laddie.

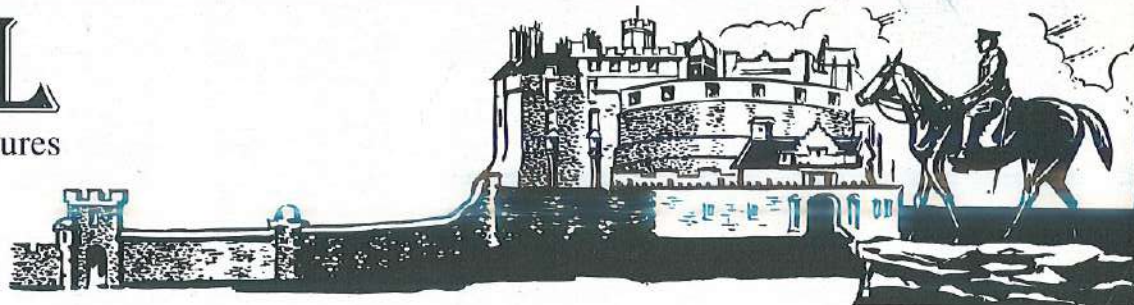

Artistic Licence - although we at DUCAL MODELS go to extreme lengths to verify the uniform details, we produce "Toy soldiers" and as such have decided to keep to the original style of soldiers with rifles at the slope but as the breakage rate is high we do not, as a rule supply them with fixed bayonets. However we do occasionally make minor changes to update our figures.

THE GUARDS ARE ON PARADE

The Queen's Foot Guards consists of the five regiments. They all wear the bearskin cap, red jacket and blue trousers but are recognisable by the spacing of the buttons, and the design on the buttons and collar badges. However, we at DUCAL MODELS cannot portray these small variations so only mark the different regiments by their plumes.

THE GRENADIER GUARDS are descended from the personal guard raised by King Charles II whilst in exile at Bruges in 1656, when the Standing or Regular Army was formed in 1660 it was known as The King's Regiment of Guards, in 1697 as First Regiment of Foot Guards, and in 1815, to commemorate their gallantry at the battle of Waterloo, they were renamed the First or Grenadier Regiment of Foot Guards. They wear a white plume on the left of the bearskin, their badge is the Royal Cypher surrounded by a Garter, while their collar badge is a Grenade and they have 8 evenly spaced buttons. The regimental marches are Scipio in slow time and The British Grenadier in quick time.

THE WELSH GUARDS was raised in 1915 by order of King George V. They wear a white, green, white plume on the left of the bearskin, their badge and collar badges show a Leek, the national emblem of Wales, and they wear their buttons in two groups of five. The regimental marches are Men of Harlech in slow time and The Rising of the Lark in quick time.

THE SCOTS GUARDS raised in Scotland as Bodyguard to King Charles I in 1642. In 1660 it was re-raised as part of the Standing Scottish Army and known as the Scottish Regiment of Foot Guards. In 1686, after various successful actions they were brought on to the English Army's establishment and took precedence within the Foot Guards as the third regiment. In 1831 King William IV gave them the unusual title Scots Fusilier Guards but the present title Scots Guards was conferred upon them by Queen Victoria in 1877. Forming up in the centre of the Line they do not wear a plume, their badge and collar badges show a Thistle, the emblem of Scotland, and they wear their buttons in three groups of three. The regimental marches are Garb of Old Gaul in slow time and Highland Laddie in quick time. The Pipers wear the Royal Stewart tartan and a blue over red plume in their Feather Bonnet.

THE IRISH GUARDS formed by Queen Victoria in 1900, have a blue plume on the right, their collar badges and badge depicts the Clover Leaf and they wear their buttons in two groups of four. The regimental marches are Let Erin Remember in slow time and St. Patrick's Day in quick time. The Irish Guards share with the Scots Guards the distinction of having a Pipe Band but are unique as being the only Guards regiment to have a Mascot, an Irish Wolfhound, to lead them on parade.

THE COLDSTREAM GUARDS raised in 1650 by General Monk for the Parliamentary Forces, during the Civil War. In 1660 King Charles II ordered them to lay down their arms and to take them up as the Second Regiment of Foot Guards. It is said that not a man moved and that General Monk declared, "Sire, that Regiment refuses to be known as second to any in the British Army". His Majesty then ordered, "Coldstream Guards, take up your arms," and to this day the Regiment has the motto - Nulli Secundus (Second to None). They wear a red plume on the right, tunic buttons are worn in pairs; their badge is the star of the Most Noble Order of the Garter - the highest order of chivalry in the land. The regiment marches past to Figaro in slow time and Milanollo in quick time.

THE COLOURS In the Brigade of Guards the Queen's Colour is crimson and bears the Regimental badge and distinctions, whilst the Regimental Colour, similar to the Union Jack, has in the centre a Company badge with a crown over. When the Colours are re-nued the next Company badge is shown on the Regimental Colour. Both the Queen's and Regimental colours carry the same number of battle honours. On the date anniversary of battle honours the colour pike is decked with a green laurel wreath. If only one colour is carried as at guard mounting or the Troop, the Queen's Colour is carried when Her Majesty is present or in residence, otherwise it is the Regimental colour that is paraded.

TROOPING THE COLOUR The third stage of the parade, the return up the Mall with the Household Cavalry in the lead, the Massed Band of 365 Bandsmen, followed by Her Majesty at the head of Her Foot Guards comprising: 3 Mounted Officers and 8 Guards, each of 3 Officers and 70 Men, and, in various positions in the parade the Mounted Personalities, gives the best potential for display as it is the only time that everybody is on the move, and the scale is feasible.

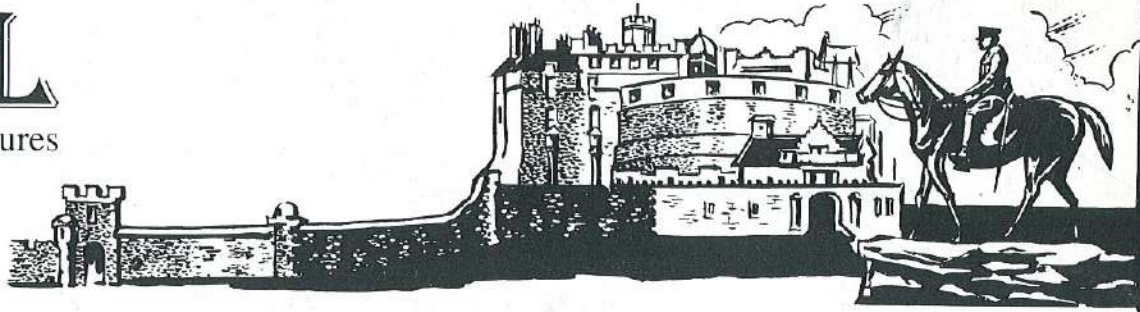

The figures M1 to M31 depict those who have taken part in The Trooping the Colour in the past. The last Field Marshal who appeared was HRH Duke of Edinburgh in 1953; the next year he rode as one of the Royal Colonels.

THE HOUSEHOLD CAVALRY

Consisting of The Life Guards (raised in 1660) and The Blues and Royals (from an amalgamation in 1969 of the Royal Horse Guards formed in 1661 and the Royal Dragoons also formed in 1661), the two Regiments share equally the Mounted Ceremonial Duties. A full Sovereigns Escort of 7 Officers and 111 other ranks is provided for Trooping the Colour, and, as there is only one Standard carried, the "Seniority" is alternated annually. The "Senior" Regiment supplies the advance guard of four Troopers, the Field Officer of the Escort, the Escort Commander and the 1st and 2nd Divisions of the Escort, each Division comprising 1 Officer and 24 other ranks; a Trumpeter in State Dress, a Standard Bearer and Standard Coverer (NCO). The rear guard of 4 troopers, Serrefile Captain in Command of the 3rd and 4th Divisions are furnished by the other Regiment. As always, bringing up the rear is a line of four; of a Farrier and Trooper Escort from both Regiments, the senior for the day being on the right of the group. In Ceremonial Dress no badges of rank are worn, all Officers wear a gold aiguillette on the right shoulder denoting that they are members of the Sovereign's personal staff; there are no Sergeants, all NCOs are various grades of Corporal. Warrant Officers and NCOs are distinguished by a smaller gold aiguillette, of varying sizes according to the rank, worn on the left shoulder.

Music for the Sovereign's Escort is provided by a Drum Horse from each Regiment and 48 Musicians riding in 6 ranks of 8, the rear rank of 8 Clarinetists being on Greys only for the Trooping ceremony. The 50 Musicians are in State Dress which is only worn when Her Majesty is present. At all other times, including the two rehearsals, Regimental Dress is worn by all, including the Farriers, Trumpeters, Directors of Music and Musicians, who all being non-combatants, never wear a cuirass.

The Director of Music for the Band is provided by the Regiment providing the Standard, therefore if the Life Guards Standard is on parade then the Director of Music is also from the Life Guards.

There are two pairs of Grooms (M8) in the procession. DUCAL MODELS can provide the Order of March for the Royal Procession of 14th June 1986, (the final year that The Queen rode Burmese). Annex C - from Buckingham Palace to Horse Guards Parade and Annex G - from Horse Guards Parade to Buckingham Palace.

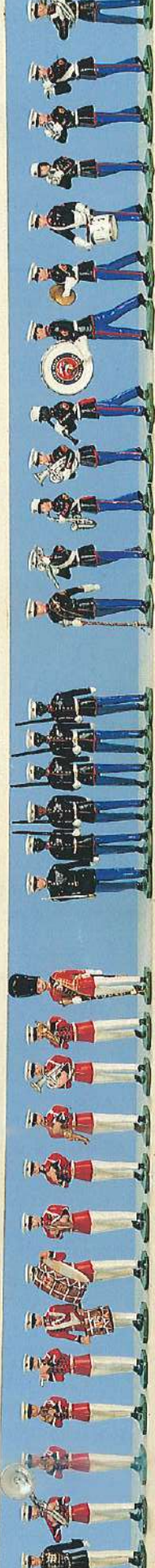

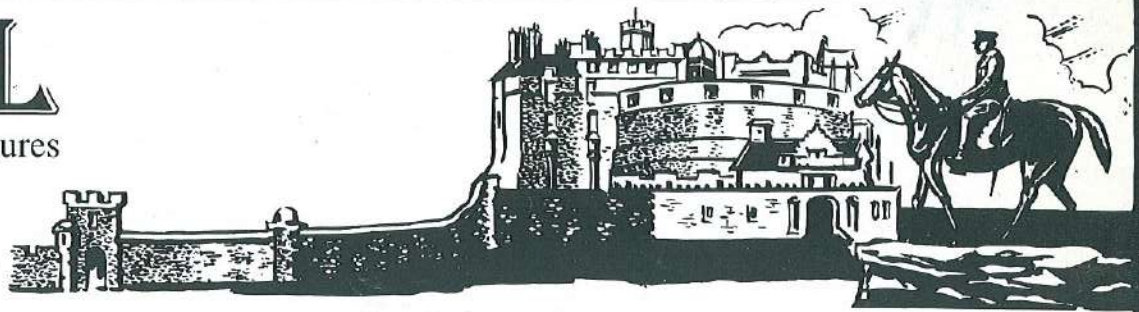

SONS OF THE SEAS

Illustrated are our examples of the seagoing section of our output of model figures for both Great Britain and the United States of America.

THE ROYAL NAVY – The Senior Service. Although the Romans and Greeks had ships designed for war, when King Alfred formed the first Royal Naval fleet ships were just normal seagoing vessels operated by sailors in the King's service that carried fighting men. By the 18th century specialist fighting ships had evolved which though still crewed by the Royal Navy sailors also carried fighting men, who were by now from the Regiments of the Line allotted for sea going service as and when needed. As armaments improved and fighting took place at greater distances the sailors manned the guns as well as crewing the ships.

THE ROYAL MARINES has a history which dates back to "THE LORD HIGH ADMIRAL'S REGIMENT", formed in 1664 but this only lasted a few years. A number of "Maritime Regiments" were raised at various dates and later disbanded or converted to Regiments of the Line. Between 1755 and 1802 permanently established Companies of Marines were raised which became the ROYAL MARINES in 1802. The Royal Marine Artillery and The Royal Marine Light Infantry were formed in 1855, in the 1922 reductions they reverted to the title The Royal Marines. Today's ceremonial uniform reflects the previous titles in the blue uniforms of the artillery and the carrying of the Infantry Colours.

UNITED STATES NAVY – formed in 1775, these show today's sailors properly depicted in both Dress Blues and Whites.

The UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS older than the Republic itself by a year, is as familiar to the average American as the flag. Smart and good at drill they perform a unique ceremonial role in Washington DC and are the President's musicians. The Marines are, as they say, looking for a few good men – however their ranks now also include women. The Marines are a separate service, under the Department of the Navy, a status that the corps has sustained since Samuel Nicholas, the first marine officer, took up his commission in 1775 during the Revolutionary War. Since 1801 the Headquarters of the USMC is the barracks at 8th and I Streets, Washington DC, where every Friday evening from mid May to mid September the ceremony of The Evening Parade is performed against the historic background. The distinctive Navy blue jacket worn as part of the full dress uniform has a unique history. In the formative years of the United States the marines used captured British jackets which were red with blue linings, by turning the jackets inside out the marines now had a blue tunic with red facings, a feature carried over to the present day. The red stripe on the blue trousers is worn only by full corporals and above, it is in fact a Battle honour awarded to non-commissioned officers after the Battle of Chapultepec in 1840, to commemorate the blood shed in the battle.

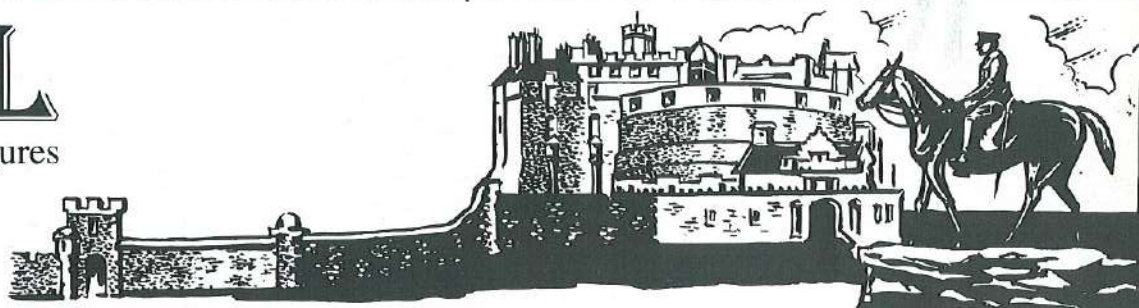
